Audition Dates and Location: The Little Theatre of Owatonna will be on Sat. March 21 from 6:00 – 9:00 pm and Sun. March 22 from 1:00 – 4:00 pm Call Backs (invitation only) will start at 4:30 pm

Rehearsals will be Mondays – Thursdays from 6:30 – 9:30 pm beginning on Monday, April 13 at 6:30 pm with an All Cast Meet and Greet and Read-through. Scripts and music will be handed out at that time.

Who can audition: We are looking for individuals aged 15+ to audition for the principal characters (listed below in the Character Breakdown) and for 16 Ensemble members who are strong singers and/or strong movers and dancers. The Ensemble is going to have a very exciting and active participation through the entire show, not just in the scripted production numbers.

Character Breakdown (Ages quoted are **character ages**, not necessarily actor ages. **** denotes character has a vocal solo in the production**):

DOROTHY GALE** (Teens – she just needs to be played by an actress who can portray innocence and youth) she has a sweet, innocent presence, which masks a brave and loyal streak.

AUNT EM/will double as Ensemble (40's-50's) she is a tough farm woman who doesn't suffer fools. She loves her niece, but doesn't tolerate her nonsense.

UNCLE HENRY/EMERALD CITY GUARD** (40's-50's) he is a farmer who has soft spot for Dorothy, but always sides with his wife when challenged. As the Emerald City Guard takes his seriously and never wants to cross the Wizard.

HUNK/SCARECROW** (20's-40's) he is a goofy farmhand who works for the Gales. As the Scarecrow he quickly befriends Dorothy on the road to Oz. He has more brains than he gives himself credit for. This role requires dance and physical comedy.

HICKORY/TIN MAN** (20's-40's) he is a bit cranky and bossy farmhand who works for the Gales. As the Tin Man he befriends Dorothy on the road to Oz. He has more heart than he gives himself credit for. This role calls for a strong mover with good comedic instincts.

ZEKE/COWARDLY LION** (20's-40's) he is a big-talking farmhand who works for the Gales. As the Cowardly Lion he befriends Dorothy on the road to Oz. He has more courage than he gives himself credit for. This role calls for a strong, physical comedian who sings and moves very well.

MISS GULCH/WICKED WITCH** (30's-50's) she lives nearby the Gale family's farm. She's got a mean streak and friends in high places. And she hates dogs! As the Wicked Witch she is on a mission to get the ruby slippers from Dorothy. This role requires singing as the Witch will have the opportunity to sing during 'The Jitterbug' number.

PROFESSOR MARVEL/WIZARD (30's-60's) is a charlatan who encounters Dorothy when she runs away. He uses trickery to tell her fortune. As the Wizard he is much the same, a man who has amassed power by pretending to be something he's not.

GLINDA** (20s – 40s) is the Good Witch of the North, a warm and welcome presence everywhere she goes

ENSEMBLE The ensemble will consist of 16 singers/dancers who will play a variety of roles – Munchkins, Ozians, and Winkies among others. There will be opportunity for spoken lines, small group or solo singing and puppetry.

MONOLOGUES

Please choose one of the following monologues to prepare for auditions. Select a monologue that fits the role you are interested in. When you audition, your monologue should be prepared and polished but does not need to be memorized. We will want to see how you interpret the character. **If interested in the role of Dorothy, please be prepared to read both monologues.**

Dorothy #1: ('Aunt' is pronounced 'Ant') Aunt Em! Aunt Em! Just listen to what Miss Gulch did to Toto.

Aunt Em, she hit him and . . . Oh, but Aunt Em, Miss Gulch hit Toto right over the back with a rake just because she says he gets into her garden and chases her nasty old cat. But he doesn't do it every day, just once or twice a Week and he can't catch her old cat anyway. Now she says she's going to get the sheriff!

Dorothy #2: No, no. You don't understand. This was a real, truly live place. And I remember that some of it wasn't very nice, but most of it was beautiful, and you were all there. You kept rusting up, and you kept pulling your own tail, and you were a humbug. Doesn't anybody believe me? [...] But anyway, Toto, we're both safe. And we're home. Home! And you're all here. And I'm not going to leave here ever, ever again, because I love you all.

Aunt Em: Almira Gulch, just because you own half the county doesn't mean you have the power to run the rest of us! For 23 years, I've been dying to tell you what I thought of you! And now ... well... being a Christian woman, I can't say it! And now, here, here, what's all this jabber-wapping when there's work to be done. I know three shiftless farm hands that'll be out of a job before they know it.

Glinda: Are you a good witch or a bad witch? Or is that the witch? Well, I'm a little muddled. The munchkins called me because a new witch has dropped a house on the wicked witch of the east. There's the house and here you are and that's all that's left of the wicked witch of the east. And so, what the munchkins want to know is, are you a good witch or a bad witch. Now, Dorothy, keep inside of the slippers. Their magic must be very powerful or she wouldn't want them so badly.

Miss Gulch/Witch: I have laid an official complaint with the County Sheriff. That dog's a menace to the community. As an act of public service, I'm taking that dog to the Sheriff and make sure he's destroyed. **(as Witch)** My enemies are about to enter the Haunted Forest. I'll conjure up a spell to take the fight out of them. Now which of my creepy crawlies shall I send to plague them? The flibberty gibbet? No! The fly by night? No! Aha! I have it! The jitterbug! There is no more infectious bug in my book of spells. Once bitten, they can never stop dancing till they drop! And when they do, you, my minions, will scoop up the little brat and the little brute and bring them both to me! Now go! *EVIL LAUGH*

Uncle Henry: You want to see me about Dorothy? Why, what has she done? You're all but lame from the bit on your leg? You mean she bit ya? Oh, she bit her dog, eh? Well, if you don't want to hear what I have to say about you, you better pedal your carcass offa my land! You have friends in high places? Why don't you climb on your broomstick and go visit 'em.

Professor Marvel/Wizard of Oz: And who might you be? No, no, now don't tell me. You're...you're travelling in disguise. No, that's not right. You're... you're running away. Ha ha! Professor Marvel never guesses. He knows! Now don't tell me...they don't understand you at home. They don't appreciate you. You want to see other lands, big cities, big mountains, big oceans. **(as Wizard)** Citizens of Oz, I, your Wizard, am about to embark upon a hazardous and technically unexplainable journey into the outer stratosphere. To confer, converse and otherwise hob-nob with my brother wizards. And I hereby decree that until that time, if any, that I return, the Scarecrow, the Tinman and the Lion shall rule in my stead. Obey them as you would me.

Hunk/Scarecrow: Now lookit, Dorothy, you ain't using your head about Miss Gulch. Think you didn't have any brains at all. When you come home, don't go by Miss Gultch's place – then Toto won't get in her garden and you won't get in no trouble. See? **(as Scarecrow)** It's very tedious being stuck up here with a pole up your back. But if you'll bend the nail down, maybe I'll slip off (falls down) Whhhhoops! Haha! There goes some of me again! I just keep picking it up and putting it back in again. My! It's good to be free! (he whirls and falls)

Hickory/Tin Man: Hurry 'fore my arms are pulled clear out of their sockets. I ain't a statue, you know. I ain't made of iron. We was just having a little fun, Mrs. Gale. I might just join the circus...be a Strong Man, (flexes his muscles) see the world **(as Tin Man)** Me...e...me...e...M-m-my, my, my my goodness, I can talk again! Oh – oil my arms, please – oil my elbows. Oh! Oh it feels wonderful. I've held that axe up for ages! About a year ago I was chopping that tree, minding my own business, when suddenly it started to rain and right in the middle of a chop. I rusted solid. And I've been that way ever since.

Zeke/Cowardly Lion: Kid, don't let that old Gulch heifer try and buffalo ya. She ain't nothing to be afraid of. You got to stand up to her, that's all, with a little courage, a little grit. Walk with your head up, your chest out and the next time she squawks, you just spit in her eye. **(as Lion)** Put 'em up! Put 'em up! Which one of you first? I'll fight you with one paw tied behind my back. I'll fight you standing on one foot. I'll fight you with my eyes closed. (after Dorothy smacks his nose - crying) Whadcha do that for? I didn't bite him! You didn't have to go and hit me, did you? Is my nose bleeding? You're right, I am a coward? I haven't got any courage at all. Look at the circles under my eyes, I haven't slept in weeks.
